Rationale





Timely diagnosis for dementia essential

- Maintain independence
- Obtaining early intervention
- Better health outcomes
- Planning for the future
- Engage support for carers & families

In ethnic communities delayed access common

- Occurring at the point of crisis
- Illness beliefs
- Poor dementia literacy/system knowledge
- Language/ses disadvantage





Why is this important?

 1 in 3 Australian over 65 is from a culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) background and this number will grow

 To ensure health equity for all in the Australian community


 Urgent need to inform CALD families about dementia, to avoid delayed diagnosis and timely access to care







Aim



Moving Pictures, a national project that aims to use film and digital media to raise dementia awareness in Australia's culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) communities.





Methods

Video interviews

Data analysis



Films cut



Films finalized & launched

Methods

- Mixed methods comprising co-production & data analytics
- Video interviews: With carers (n=112) and Health professionals (n=41) from around Australia in language (9 languages) & English.
- Data analysis: Interviews transcribed & translated verbatim, data analysed using nVivo to form the basis for film storyboards
- Storyboards workshopped with representative steering committee
 - Carer Journey
 - Navigating care
 - Detection & diagnosis
- **15 films:** 5 languages, 3 films each: Tamil, Hindi, Mandarin, Cantonese and Arabic | 12 additional films in production (Greek, Italian, Spanish, Vietnamese.
- Feedback: Focus groups x 5: n=51 (MPI) | Member checking
- Community screenings MPI post-launch (<500 community members)
- Online Community screening MPII (current)







Impact

- >20 print and broadcast stories including in the ABC, SBS, and The Australian)




- Currently developing resources in Spanish, Greek, Italian & Vietnamese

- Systematic search & via crowdsourcing from experts and academics
- Hosted on Moving Pictures website as a searchable page
- Project initiated as a collaboration with MP team and ISTAART members (Sanne Franzen, Kylie Radcliff, Mario Parra, Jayashree Dasgupta, Louise Lavrencic)
- Masters students working towards developing a prototype (Jing Ye Ooi & Veronica Lay; Monash U.)

Dementia Care Navigator CALD Specialist Western Sydney

- A better way to connect with services and support for culturally and linguistically diverse communities
- Provide education re funding and services

Dementia Care Navigator – CALD Specialist

- The Navigator role plays an integral part in the Western Sydney Primary Health Network
- Primarily for Australians from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds and special need communities where English is not their first language
- 2-year trial funded by Western Sydney Primary Health Network

Benefits to the client

- Dedicated Dementia Specialist
- Group sessions to help navigate living with dementia at all stages, including connecting with government-funded services (My Aged Care, National Disability Insurance Scheme, etc.) and other service providers
- Tailored and continuous one-on-one support available in person, via phone, email and other online forums

Benefits to the client

- Information about local services
- Expert and unbiased information
- Translated resources and ability to work with interpreters
- Support for people of all ages
- Support from pre-diagnosis to Palliative Care

Facts and stats

Every 3 seconds someone in the world develops dementia.

In Australia an estimated **250 people** join the population with dementia each day.

There are more than 472,000 people living with dementia in Australia.

In 2021 there is an estimated **28,300 people** with younger onset dementia in Australia.

By 2028 there will be an estimated **590,000 people** with a diagnosis of dementia in Australia.

By 2058 it is estimated that **1,076,000 people** will have a diagnosis of dementia in Australia.

What is dementia

Dementia is an umbrella term to describe a set of symptoms caused by brain disease.

Typical signs of dementia are gradual changes in thinking that get in the way of a person doing everyday things.

No two people are affected in exactly the same way.

It is not a normal part of ageing.
